## **Caring for the Needs of Others**

# Lesson 3 – Opening Hearts with the Gospel

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**Introduction:** What is the greatest act of service you can do for another?

- A. The greatest blessing one can bring to another is the gospel. (Rom 1:16-17)
  - 1. What does the gospel offer to men? (Eph 2:1-7)
  - 2. What can compare to the blessings that the gospel gives?
  - 3. The gospel has a relationship with God at its center. Knowing God and living by faith is the greatest blessing we can know.
- B. Do we believe the gospel is really needed?
  - 1. Consider the illustration of seeing a brother needing food and clothing. Would we act and be willing to sacrifice? What about someone without the gospel? (James 2:14-16)
  - 2. Do we long to see others saved? Are we really debtors? (Rom 1:14)
  - 3. We might have great zeal to teach others but we also need wisdom.

## I. We should seek to open a heart so that the gospel may be accepted or rejected

- A. It is not our work to save others but it is our work to spread the seed of the gospel.
  - 1. There are two common reactions to the gospel. (Acts 17:32-34)
  - 2. The opening of the heart in the scriptures is described as a "cut." Notice the two reactions when a heart is opened. (Acts 2:36-37; 7:54-55)
  - 3. Have you spent effort in reaching another and had that person turn on you?
  - 4. Showing God's love to another puts you at great risk to be hurt! Aren't you glad that others did not give up on you? (2 Tim 4:13-14)
  - 5. We have not failed with one rejects the gospel! (2 Cor 2:14-17)
- B. Hearts can be opened when men see Christ in our lives. (Mark 5:15-20)
  - 1. Jesus cast out demons in a man who had a terrible reputation.
  - 2. All the town wanted Jesus to leave and the man wanted to go with Jesus.
  - 3. Jesus told the man to stay and speak to others about "what great things the Lord has done for you." What was the result?
  - 4. How we respond to the issues of life will open the hearts of some! (1 Pt 2:11-15; 3:1-2)
  - 5. We must be consistent in our love for others and very patient. We must pray for and wait for doors to be opened! (Col 4:3-4)

## **Questions**

- 1. Make a list of the blessings that the gospel brings to one's life.
- 2. Why should a clear view of the condition of the lost change our attitude towards them? (Mt 16:26)
- 3. What should our goal be as we teach others the gospel?
- 4. Why do we often shun from sharing the gospel with others?
- 5. How can we best open another's heart to the gospel?
- 6. Have you ever played a part in bringing another to receive the gospel?

## II. How can we best teach another the gospel?

A. We must care enough to know the background of those we seek to reach.

## (1 Cor 9:19-22)

- 1. This would cause us to take great care that we do not needlessly cause them to turn away from us.
- 2. We should care enough to make real sacrifices in our time, actions and words.
- 3. We should care enough to always be truthful! (2 Cor 4:1-2)
- B. We should start with "common ground" and lead them to make a decision.
  - 1. Paul helped a Jewish audience by quoting scripture and giving eyewitness testimony. (Acts 2:25-32)
  - 2. Paul quoted a gentile poet and used an altar to an "unknown God" to point them to his eyewitness testimony. (Acts 17:22-23, 28, 30-31)
  - 3. This takes a willingness to listen and to be patient.
- C. Good teaching involves us in leading another to see the truth.
  - 1. It is often a mistake to drive to the point of disagreement first!
  - 2. Most people do not want to debate about the Bible because they know so little about it! This is like challenging someone to play chess that has never done so.
  - 3. This likely will bring out stubbornness and anger.
  - 4. When a person has struggled with issues and found the truth they then will have a logical basis on which to stand. (1 Pt 3:15)
  - 5. This kind of teaching takes time.
- D. What are some common objections that close people's hearts? (2 Tim 2:24-26)
  - 1. Why did God allow this bad thing to happen?
  - 2. Will I go to hell if I do not believe like you do?
  - 3. There have been hypocrites I have known that called themselves Christians!
  - 4. How can I know that God and Jesus are real?
  - 5. Will I will be condemning my grandmother if I become a Christian?

## **Questions**

- 1. What kind of preparation do we need to make *in addition* to knowing the gospel message?
- 2. How can matters in our personal life help or hinder the gospel?
- 3. Where should we start teaching a particular individual?
- 4. Why did Paul <u>not quote</u> Old Testament scripture to Gentile unbelievers?
- 5. Which is the best ways to teach: (a) to start at the area of disagreement and debate or (b) to start at common ground and lead to the point of disagreement?
- 6. What kind of objections have you faced by those who are resisting you sharing the gospel with them? How should you respond?
