# Heaven and the Afterlife Lesson 4 - The Resurrection of the Dead

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*Introduction:* The path from the Hadean world to one's final abode goes through the resurrection of the body.

- A. As in New Testament times we have men today who say that their will be no future resurrection of the body. (1 Cor 15:12; 2 Tim 2:17-18)
  - 1. The key to this question lies in understanding the resurrection of Christ from the dead.
  - 2. This is a key question that God expects us to understand.
- B. The resurrection of the dead goes against our experience in this life. (Heb 9:27)
  - 1. That is why this was such a powerful sign in Jesus' ministry and would be the sign of signs for those who wanted proof of Jesus' identity.
  - 2. We all we receive a new body in the life to come. (2 Cor 5:1-4)

# I. Old Testament passages that help us understand a future resurrection

- A. Jesus used the burning bush passage as evidence of a future resurrection. (Mt 22:31-32)
  - 1. This shows that man does not go out of existence at death.
  - 2. From their being alive then a future body is expected.
- B. Job expected to have a body after his flesh had decayed. (Job 19:25-27)
  - 1. This thought had to be comforting while he was suffering in his body.
  - 2. How did Job know this?
- C. Daniel spoke of a resurrection of the dead and two possible destinations. (Dan 12:2)
  - 1. Hosea language is used by Paul to describe the future resurrection. (Hosea 13:14: 1 Cor 15:55)
  - 2. Also consider these verses. (Psa 17:15; Isa 26:19)
  - 3. What was faintly mentioned in the Old, the New Testament plainly gives us! (2 Tim 1:10)

# II. Jesus spoke in His ministry about a future general resurrection

- A. Did Jesus discussed a literal resurrection and a very different afterlife in His ministry.
  - 1. What was the disagreement with the Sadducees about? (Lk 20:27, 34-36)
  - 2. After the resurrection, what would be true of all those who were raised? Is this true today?
- B. Jesus had taught Mary about a future resurrection of the dead.
  - 1. Mary spoke of a future resurrection for Lazarus. Jesus did not correct her but gave emphasis to His power to raise the dead! (Jn 11:23-26)
  - 2. If there was any doubt what kind of resurrection this would be then it was eliminated when Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead! (Jn 11:40-45)
- C. Jesus taught a general resurrection for all men. (Jn 5:28-29; Acts 24:15-16)

- 1. There are two groups and two destinations.
- 2. Paul pointed out that this would happen at the same time!

- 1. Why do we need to know clearly about a future resurrection?
- 2. How does the Old Testament teach us about a future resurrection?
- 3. What did Mary know about a future resurrection? How do we know that she was right?
- 4. How does the resurrection of Lazarus help us understand our future resurrection?
- 5. Will there be two future resurrections at different times?

### III. What does the Resurrection teaches us about future events?

- A. If Jesus was raised then all men who ever lived will be raised.
  - 1. Paul reasoned with unbelievers that they would be held accountable at the judgment day and the proof of this would be the resurrection of Christ. (Acts 17:30-32)
  - 2. Why would the resurrection of Christ have any connection to proof of a future judgment of all men? Consider how Paul develops this reasoning with Christians. (2 Cor 4:13-14; 1 Cor 6:14; Phil 3:20-21, 1 Jn 3:2)
  - 3. Is this resurrection a figurative resurrection of a cause?
- B. Will all men see and personally experience things at the second coming of Christ?
  - 1. Christians are expecting to see and meet Jesus at His coming.

## (1 Jn 3:1-2; 1 Thess 4:13-18)

- 2. Since this is connected to Jesus' resurrection, then in what manner will we see Jesus? Is this a past event only applicable to the righteous?
- 3. Will the unrighteous also see Jesus coming in the clouds? (Rev 1:5-7)
- C. Consider the power of the resurrection as developed in 1 Corinthians 15.
  - 1. Christ's resurrection was only a "first-fruit" of a future harvest! (1 Cor 15:20-23)
  - 2. This future body will be spiritual and incorruptible! (1 Cor 15:42-49)
  - 3. Each body will have its own individuality. (1 Cor 15:38)
  - 4. This resurrection is the ultimate defeat of death! (1 Cor 15:50-57)
  - 5. It is in this future hope that we gladly endure suffering in this life. (1 Cor 15:58)

- 1. What kind of resurrection did Jesus experience? How can we know this?
- 2. How does the resurrection of Christ teach us about our future resurrection?
- 3. Why do we know that our future resurrection involves our body and is not just a figurative resurrection?
- 3. What kind of body will we have when we are raised?
- 4. How does Paul's use of "first-fruits" in 1 Cor 15 help us understand the certainty of a future resurrection?
