The Place and Work of the Apostles Lesson 6 – Defending the Place of Apostles <u>www.aubeacon.com</u>

Introduction: The foundation of God withstand the attacks of Satan.

- A. It is vital for every Christian to know where God has built His foundations.
 - 1. A foundation built by God will never be moved! We must choose it! (1 Cor 3:10-11; 2 Tim 2:19)
 - 2. Satan will seek to first create doubt and then turn you from God's foundation.
 - 3. Many in an unreasonable, emotional mindset have accepted a view of the work of the Apostles (the New Testament) that *make it without meaning*.
- B. Our God wishes to give us a *clear, understandable and definite path* in which to walk. We can find answers to questions and give a reason for our hope. (1 Pt 3:15)
 - 1. Certainty can be found. It is not to be feared or condemned.
 - 2. Those who follow the spirit of this age claim they have a better way. They view certainty as "harsh and legalistic." Their way is a broad way.
 - 3. Where are the promises and blessings of God found? (Eph 2:20; Eph 5:17)

I. The Defense of Paul's Apostleship

A. Some attacked the genuineness of Paul's apostleship. (Gal 1:1, 11-12)

- 1. One can know if someone was an apostle or not. (Rev 2:2; 2 Cor 11:12-13)
- 2. Paul's defense will help us to have confidence in the New Testament. Many attack the place of the apostle Paul because they do not like what he taught!
- B. An apostle was chosen by God and not by or through men.
 - 1. Jesus personally chose the apostles in His ministry.
 - 2. After His ascension men were instructed to gather men from a certain background but the choice was made by God! (Acts 1:21-26)
 - 3. At Paul's conversion Ananias by inspiration told Paul that he was chosen to be an apostle. (Acts 9:15; 22:14-15)
 - 4. Paul boldly stated this truth. It was *by the will of God*! We can know His will. (1 Cor 1:1; 2 Cor 1:2; Eph 1:1; 2 Tim 1:1)
- C. An apostle was given God's will directly from heaven through the Holy Spirit.
 - 1. Paul immediately began boldly preaching Jesus Christ. (Acts 9:19-20)
 - 2. He preached for over 3 years before meeting other apostles. (Gal 1:15-18)
 - 3. An apostle will not contradict another apostle or other scripture! A false apostle could easily be exposed here.
- D. An apostle could work mighty signs through the Holy Spirit. (2 Cor 12:11-12)
 - 1. Paul appealed to what the Corinthians knew to be true!
 - 2. Their personal conversion was a result of Paul's teaching. (2 Cor 10:13-14)
- E. An apostle would be recognized by other apostles.
 - 1. Peter and James recognized Paul's apostleship. (Gal 1:18; 2:7-9)
 - 2. The apostles in the presence of the church in Jerusalem recognized Paul's teaching. (Acts 15:2)
 - 3. Peter in his writings recognized Paul as writing scripture! (2 Pt 3:15-16)

II. Defending the place of the apostles today

- A. We must *reject false apostles*. Consider how some directly claim the apostles' place.
 - 1. How would we test a specific individual?
 - 2. The Mormon church claims living apostles.
 - 3. The Catholic church claims that the Pope has authority from a line of men going back to Peter. A few other churches make similar claims.
- B. We must reject men who teach that the apostles *have no authority over us today*.
 - 1. This rejection can come in varying degrees.
 - 2. After most of the apostles had died the gnostic movement came within the church. The Gnostics wrote their own "gospels" in later centuries.
 - 3. The key then as well as now would be determined if brethren would continue listening to the apostles instead of the world. (1 Jn 4:1, 4-6)
 - 4. Those who deny that authority is needed for all teachings and practice have rejected the place and work of the apostles. (Acts 15:24; Col 3:17)
- C. We must fight those who *in secret teach "destructive heresies*." (2 Pt 2:1)
 - 1. The foundation of the apostles and prophets is based upon an honest heart humbly seeking truth through the New Testament. (Lk 8:15)
 - 2. Those that stand upon this foundation will openly teach and defend their teaching. (2 Cor 4:2; 3:2; Jn 1:47)
 - 3. Those that follow Jesus will be honest and open. (Lk 20:4-7, Jn 18:20)
- D. We must fight those who would *plant bitterness and pride*. When the heart is poisoned then *doctrine no longer matters*!
 - 1. How do people *suddenly* rebel against an eldership and destroy relationships that have been built for years? They have help. (1 Jn 2:9-11)
 - 2. They use emotion to separate them from others. They can become "captives" with closed hearts except to their "masters." (Gal 4:16-17; 2 Pt 2:18-19)
 - 3. I have been shocked to see the ridicule of brethren publicly. It is hard for those exposed to this over time to overcome it. Ex. Korah (Num 16:41)
 - 4. Pride and bitterness are common partners. (Lk 18:9, Jas 3:14; 1 Jn 2:16)
 - 5. Pride is often employed by those who have no foundation so they seek to <u>artificially</u> build themselves up. They look down on brethren. (1 Cor 8:1-3)
 - 6. Pride rejoices in the faults of others. You live in the land of "throw-away" people. You write them off with no attempt to work with them.
