When I Was Baptized

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Introduction: I will never forget the day of my birth!

- A. A common theme of the new birth is rejoicing! (Acts 8:39)
 - 1. Why the rejoicing at the point of baptism? It was the time of a new birth, a new life! (Jn 3:5; Rom 6:4)
 - 2. This was not just some ceremony; it was a true change in everything that I was and changed everything that would follow in my life.
- B. What does your baptism mean to you?
 - 1. May we be challenged you to look back and remember. I hope that memory will be one of joy and not regret over what "might have been."
 - 2. What follows the new birth? That is what Jesus was also concerned with. (Mt 28:18-20)

I. My baptism was a product of a faith that trusted Jesus

- A. Even though I was raised "going to church" I still needed to learn to trust God.
 - 1. What I am describing is true for every person that reaches the age of accountability.
 - 2. Without having trust in God I had no answers for the guilt of sin. (Rom 7:8-9)
 - 3. I did not understand why Jesus died and relied on the "good old boy" approach to the final judgment. When facing death I knew this to be empty.
 - 4. Because I did not trust God, I stopped attending services. At services my guilt could be aroused and I did not want to face that.
 - 5. I will never forget one "witnessing" to me one autumn day.
- B. I decided on the summer after I graduated from High school to read the bible for myself.
 - 1. Fortunately the schedule I used started me in Psalms and Acts and Romans.
 - 2. It was in this reading that I developed my faith in God.
 - 3. I wanted to have the kind of assurance that Paul had. (Rom 8:18, 33-37)
- C. I walked in the door of the denomination that I was raised and responded to the invitation one August Sunday morning.
 - 1. That night I was baptized according to the teachings of that church.
 - 2. I went on my way rejoicing that night. I was excited to know there was so much more to learn. My guilt was past and I could be honest with the God that I now trusted. This was a first step and a very incomplete one.

II. My baptism was tested by the word of God

- A. God's providence allowed me to move away from home to go to college.
 - 1. At college I was challenged in my belief in the scripture.
 - 2. The professor at Samford University that attacked the inspiration of the Bible in a required Bible course did not shake me.
 - 3. Having learned to trust God, I patiently studied through the questions raised. (Acts 17:11)

B. When I transferred to the University of Alabama I attended the University church of Christ and was challenged about the plan of salvation!

(Mk 16:15-16; 1 Pt 3:20-21)

- 1. The notes I took that night I went home and shared them with my roommate.
- 2. It was at this point I could see that there would be relationships that would be tested by what conclusion I drew from scripture. (Jn 9:20-22, 32-34)
- 3. I concluded that baptism was the final step into Christ. I also assumed that my earlier baptism was fine!
- 4. The next Wednesday Night Ron Gholston raised questions about my earlier baptism. (Acts 19:1-5)
- 5. There were several things that my earlier response lacked. (Rom 10:9-10)
- 6. The next Sunday night I responded to the invitation and was baptized into Christ!

III. My baptism brought me into a new family and into new relationships

A. I knew that I needed to stand with those who accurately taught the gospel.

(Gal 1:6-10)

- 1. At the same time I did not want to come across as arrogant and condemning.
- 2. I was immediately taught how to share the teaching of the gospel.
- 3. I saw most of my family immediately <u>shut their ears to me</u>. One did not and my brother later obeyed the gospel. (Rom 6:17-18)
- B. My father immediately challenged me.
 - 1. He did not approve of both me and my brother standing by faith.
 - 2. He personally challenged me on instrumental music.
 - 3. Over time he changed his attitude towards us. What made the difference? Over time he saw a genuine faith in his sons. (**Titus 2:9-10**)
- C. While remaining close to my immediate family, I began to from a new family!
 - 1. I identified with local churches as I moved. (Acts 9:26-28)
 - 2. It was in the devotionals and other associations that my new friends were made. I did not plan to lose and gain friends.
 - 3. I came to appreciate Peter's exchange with the Lord. (Mk 10:26-30)

IV. My baptism taught me to examine doctrines and the churches that hold them

- A. Over time my faith caused me to leave the University church.
 - 1. Simply by raising questions about differences among brethren raised the same kind of emotion responses that I saw in my family. (Jn 7:47-52)
 - 2. This was a most difficult decision that I had to make.
- B. Today this church has taken the opposite view on baptism.

V. My baptism was never forgotten

- A. I am remembering the God who forgave me. (2 Pt 1:9-10)
- B. That same faith continues to trust in the "working of God!" (Col 2:11-13) *Conclusion:* What do you remember?
