### How Jesus Endured the Cross <u>www.aubeacon.com</u>

*Introduction:* It is very difficult for us to comprehend the love of God.

- A. We read about how Jesus endured the cross. (Heb 12:1-2)
  - 1. Have you ever thought about how difficult this was?
  - 2. Let us consider both the pain of the cross but also how Jesus was able to keep His mind upon the Father and His promises.
- B. Jesus' suffering is mean to teach us about our own times of trial. (Heb 12:3-4)
  - 1. How many have heroes in sports that inspire them not to quit?
  - 2. Rest assured that on the pathway to becoming an effective servant of God we will be tested!

# I. Jesus knew the Father's will and character

- A. Jesus took on flesh and willingly limited the use of His powers. (Jn 1:14)
  - 1. He met opposition and difficult circumstances. (Jn 1:10-11)
  - 2. Imagine the temptation to show His powers and convince the world who He is?
  - 3. Jesus knew that God's plan was to reach a certain kind of people. Raw worldly power was not how the Father would reach men.
  - 4. Satan played on this by saying "if you are the Son of God." (Mt 4:6-7)
- B. Jesus wanted to show us how to have a relationship with the Father!
  - 1. Over and over He declared that the entirety of His teaching and deeds were wholly found in the revealed will of God. (Jn 8:28-29; Isa 50:5-6)
  - 2. We know in the garden how he prayed fervently but would always yield to "not as I will, but as you will." (Mt 26:39)
  - 3. If you want to have a relationship with the Father please look at the cross!

## II. Consider the temptations that the cross brought to Jesus

- A. There was the enormous physical suffering. (Isa 52:14; 53:3-5)
  - 1. It was impossible to pass out in crucifixion.
  - 2. The anticipation, the crowd and the pain caused most to lose control.
  - 3. Jesus remained in control and sought to help others!
- B. There was His loved ones looking on in great pain.
  - 1. Simeon told Mary that "a sword would pierce your soul." That time had come. (Lk 2:34-35)
  - 2. Imagine being present at this conversation. (Jn 19:25-27)
  - 3. Jesus knew that He was giving them eternal life! No turning back!
- C. At any moment He could have come down from the cross. (Mt 26:53-54)
  - 1. This is a massive temptation. All it would take was just a moment of weakness.
  - 2. In long distance races or long sprints to the finish there is the temptation to just rest for a moment.

### III. Jesus kept thinking about the nature and will of God

- A. Jesus saw that He was forsaken. (22:1-2)
  - 1. Jesus was crying out to God in His pain. (Mt 27:46)
  - 2. He cried out both in light and darkness. (Mt 27:45)
  - 3. Jesus now compared what his physical eyes saw to what He knew about God!
- B. But Jesus knew that God is always true! (22:3-5)
  - 1. Because Jesus had so prepared His heart, He could see beyond the physical realm. He knew God's promises. (1 Pt 2:21-23)
  - 2. God is "enthroned in the praises of Israel." Why? He is holy!
  - 3. God will always deliver those who trust in Him. There are no exceptions! (Ps 34:3-5)
- C. Jesus saw that He was despised. (22:6-8)
  - 1. After being beaten and nailed to the cross His appearance was that of a worm.
  - 2. His enemies surrounded Him and shouted insults. (Mt 27:41-44)
  - 3. Evil men will try to beat the righteous down with their deeds and their tongues.
- D. Jesus knew that God had always loved Him. (22:9-11)
  - 1. God provided for Him from conception! He does so to us as well.
  - 2. Because of this He called out for God's help and was comforted that He will answer! He will always help when there is "none to help."
- E. Jesus saw that His body was wounded and dying. (22:12-18)
  - 1. Jesus described in detail the physical effects of a death upon the cross.
  - 2. During His death he heard hatred and scorn from those surrounding Him. The soldiers even gambled for His clothing. (Mt 27:35-36)
- F. Jesus knew that God would deliver Him. (22:19-21)
  - 1. In spite of everything He could see, He knew that God would respond!
  - 2. Abraham had this kind of faith. (Rom 4:17-18; Heb 11:18-19)
  - 3. Will you prepare you mind so you too will believe these things in suffering?

## IV. Will we also follow the footsteps of Jesus in suffering?

- A. Being stripped of my "rights" can bring me closer to God.
  - 1. Consider the conclusion of Job. (Job 42:5-6)
  - 2. Remember the Hebrew writer's exhortation: "You have not yet resisted to bloodshed, striving against sin."
- B. More doors to help others are opened in suffering. (2 Cor 1:3-4)
  - 1. If our goal is to glorify God and not ourselves then our attitude towards suffering will be like Paul's. (2 Cor 12:9-10)
  - 2. Do we really want to be like Jesus?

## *Conclusion:* Let us never take our eyes off the cross of Christ. (Gal 6:14)
