Finding Peace, a Guardian of Our Hearts and Minds <u>www.aubeacon.com</u>

Introduction: God pleads with us to pursue things that allow His power to work in us.

- A. We often take on things that only will bring us painful failures. God has given us conditional promises that will always bring success. (1 Thess 2:13; Phil 2:12-13)
 - 1. Trusting God's way is a great challenge when we are constantly taught the world's way!
 - 2. When we consider the subject of peace, the world will have a false definition and false ways to find "peace." Let us listen to God. (Jer 6:14)
- B. God identifies Himself as "the God of peace" four times in the New Testament.

(Rom 16:20)

- 1. Peace is found in the fruit of the Spirit. (Gal 5:22-23)
- 2. When we come to know God and His nature then peace will become a very precious thing that we will diligently pursue.
- 3. The key to a long and good life is found when we "seek peace and pursue it." (1 Pt 3:10-11)

I. Why is God's peace so powerful?

- A. Because it comes from God's nature and is the basis of our relationship with Him.
 1. What is "peace?" <u>Peace</u> εἰρήνη, (1) literally, as a state of *peace* (LU 14.32), opposite πόλεμος (armed conflict, war); figuratively, as an agreement between persons (JA 3.18), in contrast to διαμερισμός (division, dissension); (3) as a religious disposition characterized by inner rest and harmony *peace, freedom from anxiety* (RO 15.13); (4) as a state of reconciliation with God (GA 5.22);....
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 - 2. God's very nature seeks to bring all men into a relationship with Himself that results in real purpose and harmony in our lives!
- B. As a holy God He has provided forgiveness so that we might abide in fellowship with Him. (Rom 5:1; Heb 13:20-21)
 - 1. God was able to bridge the gap that seemed insurmountable! (Rom 6:23)
 - 2. God continues to change us *towards His holiness* as we walk by faith.
 - 3. We point all men toward the Lordship of Jesus Christ where we live a life of claiming His precious promises by faith. (Acts 10:36; 1 John 1:5-7)
- C. We now can have a great peace of mind knowing God is with us!
 - 1. We are born again by responding to God's conditional promise! (1 Pt 3:21 NASV)
 - 2. We continue to be forgiven as we repent and confess to Him!
 - 3. Many struggle with guilt and as a result are weakened by inner conflict. God can give you peace if you will *pursue it*. (2 Tim 2:22)
 - 4. Casual people will not purse holiness and will never find God's peace. Our hearts must be exposed so that our guilt leads to repentance and forgiveness! (Heb 4:12-13; Jer 6:14-15)

II. How can God's peace produce peace with others?

A. Here is where our faith in God will put to the test.

- 1. We *cannot change others against their will*. When we try we will have misery.
- 2. We may dearly want to have peace with others but our loyalty to God will actually cause conflict! (Mt 10:34-39; Gal 1:10)
- 3. We must want men to be right with God. Until they yield to the Lordship of Jesus there can be no peace with God or His people.
- 4. Satan's peace comes through compromise and putting earthly relationships above a relationship with God. Peer pressure is a powerful tool of Satan.
- B. There is a *doctrinal core* we build which will help others find peace with God.

(1 Pt 3:10-11)

- 1. We will seek truth. We will *<u>tell the truth</u>*.
- 2. We will always live by God's truth and *not play favoritism*.
- 3. We will not rejoice in what is wrong. Consider the kind of humor we like!
- 4. We will watch our tongues and refrain from gossip. *We will not participate!*
- 5. Worldly people will notice when you live like this!
- 6. We will not compromise God's conditional promises to please men. (Gal 6:12)

III. How can we have peace within a local church?

A. We together must pursue holiness and be humbly transformed.

(Heb 12:14-15; Phil 4:9)

- 1. Our brothers in Christ will often disappoint and hurt us. Work all problems out!
- 2. We must release all desire for vengeance and seek repentance for any sin.
- 3. Longsuffering and forgiveness allows us to be free from a terrible burden. (Eph 4:31-32; 4:1-3)
- B. We must never *assume God's place* in working with our brethren.
 - 1. When someone is struggling with personal growth, we need to know our proper place in working with him. (Rom 14:1-4)
 - 2. We must <u>seek justice and mercy</u> as we view others. We cannot read minds and "instinctively" know what another has said or done.
 - 3. We must <u>watch our tongues</u>. As an example, what should we do when we have knowledge of another's sin? Are we sure? What does the Lord want you to do? (Lk 17:3)
 - 4. We must <u>watch our thoughts</u>! We cannot discard our brethren because our imagination or another's gossip has poisoned our hearts. (Ex. "Oh if you really knew him!" Innuendo is gossip!) (1 Pt 1:22; 2 Cor 13:11)

IV. How can God's peace guard our hearts and minds?

- A. We learn to give to God those things which He is to handle! (Phil 4:6-7)
 - 1. What silly burdens we often bear that God has not given us.
 - 2. We lose strength and then become weakened to sin.
 - 3. When we are fatigued we often lose control of our thoughts.
 - 4. We need both physical and mental rest. (Mt 11:28-30)
- B. A thankful heart will daily remind us of the providential care of God. (Col 3:15)
 - 1. Thanksgiving is a choice. What is your decision?
 - 2. Others will see the Lord in you when you live in the peace of His calling!
