Introduction: What are you made of?

- A. The power of knowing a living God is the power to see. (Jn 8:32)
 - 1. Conversion brings forgiveness, humility and hope.
 - 2. When our relationship with God becomes our life, then we are not afraid to open our eyes and let God work with us. (Col 3:2-4)
- B. Because we can drift from such a heart we need mirrors to help us see ourselves.
 - 1. A mirror will work if we want to see and change.
 - 2. Open your heart and look at who you are and where you are going.

I. The mirror of God's word

A. This is a powerful mirror for the one who wishes to see.

- 1. Many use God's word for human agendas. Jesus point out that these people will never understand God's word. (Mt 13:14-16)
- 2. Why did the apostles see but others could not? They <u>really wanted to</u> <u>understand</u> God's word. (Jn 5:44-47)
- 3. Be wise when you hear complaints about preaching and teaching. Worldly people will *never appreciate proper teaching*. (1 Jn 4:5-6)
- 4. Have you lost your hunger and thirst for righteousness? (Mt 5:6)
- B. What does the mirror tell us about serious readers? (James 1:22-25)
 - 1. You really want to change. What would one do if he does not want to change?
 - 2. You first understand then you work towards *remembering and applying* over a period of time.
 - 3. Where does the mirror say about your interest in changing? Are you teachable?

II. The mirror of your memory

- A. If we know God we look at the past with great gratitude for God's grace. (Eph 2:11-13)
 - 1. We, of all people, can see the hopelessness of living without God.
 - 2. We should look on our past like Israel did their slavery in Egypt.
 - 3. As the Israelites observed the Passover and remembered, so should we completely identify our past with the deliverance in the cross of Christ!
- B. How we view the past will determine how we view ourselves.
 - 1. The power of conversion and forgiveness as a true foundation of our lives gives us a power and a confidence to live. (1 Tim 1:12-15)
 - 2. Here is where many struggle. Their conversion does not release them from the past. This is a battle we must win.
- C. Consider the OT character Shimei, of the house of King Saul.
 - 1. This man identified himself with his family and all views they held.
 - 2. 20 Years after Saul's death, Shimei shows his heart to everyone. How sad for a man to let his past mold him this way! (2 Sam 16:7-8, 13)

5. A bitter past brings a depressed and angry life.

III. The mirror of your relationships

- A. You can definitely see your spiritual direction by your relationships.
 - 1. Peter made a series of bad decisions that led him into a place where he would fall. (Lk 22:54)
 - 2. Paul was encouraged to know he had brethren that would stand with him! (Acts 18:9-11)
 - 3. I am speaking of relationships where we depend on others and let our guard down around others.
 - 4. Our relationships change over time. How are they changing?
- B. Are you moving away from zealous, faithful Christians? (Ps 1:1-3)
 - 1. You can move to those in the world or to worldly Christians, both will work against your spiritual life. (Prov 13:20)
 - 2. Some have what is called a "toxic faith." They are scoffers and pull you into a pool of poison. (1 Cor 15:33)
 - 3. When you are drifting doctrinally this also happens. (Gal 4:16-17)
 - 4. You must fight and escape such relationships! I have known of some respected preachers like this.
 - 5. What a blessing to have "crazy" friends that love to talk about the word of God and of saving souls! (Ps 119:63: Mal 3:16-18)
 - 6. You friends or lack of friends is a mirror to who you are. What do you see?

IV. The mirror of your tongue

- A. Jesus told us that our tongues will show what is in our hearts. (Mk 7:21-23)
 - 1. What do you love to talk about?
 - 2. Relationships are determined by what we are most interested in. You want to share what is in your heart with another who will also value what you value.
- B. How we think and act towards others is a powerful mirror.
 - 1. Consider your attitudes toward brethren and the world (1 Jn 2:9-11)
 - 2. Jesus was a servant looking to the needs of others. Do you complain because brethren are not serving you? (Rom 15:1-2)
- C. Is your tongue filled with praise and thanksgiving?
 - 1. A great way to move back to God is seeing Him and being filled with praise. (Col 2:6-7)
 - 2. You will also love to speak well of your brother in Christ. You want to build them up! (Eph 4:29-32)
 - 3. Are others reflecting my attitude towards them? Think about this.
- *Conclusion:* Always be thankful when you can see where you are and that you know God will help!
