# Overcoming the Snares of Satan

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*Introduction:* We must never take the care and protection of God for granted.

- A. We face and adversary that is cunning and powerful. We alone are no match. (1 Pt 5:8)
  - 1. The costs of being overcome are enormous and sobering.
  - 2. Satan's most powerful tool is his ability to take away our ability to reason. (2 Cor 4:3-4)
- B. Our God offers us a perfect protection from this adversary. (1 Jn 5:18)
  - 1. Satan cannot touch us!
  - 2. The ability to overcome is simply the ability to walk by faith. (1 Jn 2:13-14)
  - 3. What can defeat us is pride and arrogance. We need to see the dark end of those who step away from a humble, thankful service to God.

#### I. The Power of a snare

- A. What is a snare?
  - 1. παγίς (1) literally, anything that catches and holds fast *snare*, *trap*, *noose*, *net* (LU 21.35); (2) metaphorically; (a) used in RO 11.9 of a false sense of security that leads to a sudden and unexpected judgment *pitfall*, *concealed danger*, *source of error*; (b) as a stratagem of the devil for gaining control *deceitful trick*, *entanglement* (1T 3.7); (3) figuratively, as any allurement to wrongdoing *enticement*, *temptation*, *attraction* (1T 6.9) **Freiberg's Lexicon**
- B. A snare is a result of cunning and deceit.
  - 1. You are outwitted by the one who snares you. Often your overconfidence is an essential element in the snare.
  - 2. How many scoffers who despised wisdom are snared? (Prov 18:6-7)
- C. A snare is costly to escape.
  - 1. What are the costs to the raccoon who escapes the leghold trap? What if he doesn't?
  - 2. Our God provides for us a way <u>to escape all snares</u>. We must humble ourselves and thirst after His wisdom. (Ps 124:6-8; 1 Cor 10:12-13)
  - 3. Let us look to some Bible examples about Satan's snares.

# II. The Snare of Balaam

- A. Balaam was a prophet who gave in to a love of money. (2 Pt 2:15-16)
  - 1. He was known as a man who knew God's ways. (Num 22:5-6)
  - 2. Satan attacked at his weakest point. Balaam knew better but somehow thought in his overconfidence that he could both serve God and money.
- B. He could not turn away from temptation. He kept coming back to seek where His heart really wanted to go. (Num 22:18-19)
  - 1. Did he really need any *more* from the Lord?
  - 2. He truly became crazy and was not humbled when his <u>donkey talked to him</u> and revealed the consequences of his course of action! (Num 22:22-35)

- 3. He gave up serving God and joined the enemies of God. You could say he was a former "legalist" that was now free to pursue fellowship with the Moabites.
- 4. He cursed Israel in another way and was killed in God's judgment. (Num 31:8)
- 5. He never escaped the snare. Hear of his eternal place. (2 Pt 2:17)
- C. This snare still works today! (1 Tim 6:9-10)
  - 1. How many put work ahead of God?
  - 2. How you set priorities now will determine your practice in life.

# III. The Snare of Jezebel

- A. An individual was named for a terrible influence upon Christians. (Rev 2:20-23)
  - 1. The lust of the flesh is a powerful snare. We must <u>never</u> be haughty about this.
  - 2. How many have thought they could secretly walk down this path with no consequences? (Prov 7:22-27)
  - 3. How many are snared in pornography or a relationship that drives them away from God?
- B. Consider the draw of relationships and drinking. (1 Pt 4:3-4)
  - 1. We have had both "Christians" and visitors leave us when warnings were given.
  - 2. Some have mocked the warnings on social media.
  - 3. Addictions have overcome a vast number who suffer "out of sight."
  - 4. It is a very powerful snare to overcome. (Prov 7:24-27)
  - 5. Members of a new "non-traditional" church in Birmingham aggressively boast in social media of their freedom to drink. They also introduce this to others.

# IV. The Snare of Esau

- A. Esau would be the classic "good old boy" of today. He does not want to hurt anyone but is not very motivated in spiritual things. (1 Jn 2:15-17)
  - 1. He let a temporary hunger be the reason to sell out a valuable spiritual blessing.
  - 2. Our priorities are shown in our decisions. (Gen 25:29-34)
  - 3. How did he "despise" his birthright?
- B. Becoming a "profane" person puts one in a terrible snare. (Heb 12:15-16)
  - 1. A "profane" person does not know God or his ways.
  - 2. Imagine an untrained person from another culture trying to land a high level job. When we do not know God we will be found fighting Him.
  - 3. We must forsake the path of compromise to stand with the Lord. (Rev 3:15-16)
- C. Many are being pulled into churches that boast in "positive preaching." (Prov 29:25)
  - 1. Those who think they are smarter than God will end up fighting Him.
  - 2. In time the mind will be lost when we turn away from correction. Correction keeps us from snares! (Ps 91:2-4)
  - 3. Gideon failed to heed such a warning. There are some things we must not "pity and try to "understand." (Deut 7:16; Judges 8:27)

**Conclusion:** Our God has graciously given us a path that is free from snares! (2 Tim 2:24-26)
