The Curse of Balaam www.aubeacon.com

Introduction: One person can do much good or much harm to the people of God.

- A. We can see this through Adam and Jesus Christ. (Rom 5:15)
 - 1. We need to build up every member. What is the potential of one child?
 - 2. There is also a need to be watchful. The greatest threat to God's people always comes from within.
- B. The Lord wishes us to understand and be aware of men like Balaam.

(Jude 3-4, 11-13)

- 1. When men lose control of their hearts, doctrine does not matter anymore.
- 2. These men will, in time, leave a local group. The question is: "Who will they take with them?"
- 3. The handling of God's word is an indicator of the heart! Allowing a leaven to remain among God's people will result in many being destroyed.

I. Balaam was at one time a faithful prophet of God

- A. There is a legitimate debate about this. He is called a prophet. (2 Pt 2:15-16)
 - 1. He was a Gentile who lived in Pethor in Mesopotamia (Deut 23:4)
 - 2. He is also called a "soothsayer." (Joshua 13:22)
 - 3. He offered sacrifices contrary to the Law.

4. I believe he was a prophet who God spoke with who later became a soothsayer.

- B. He accurately spoke of the character of God.
 - 1. He pointed out that a real prophet could only speak what God gave him. (Num 22:18, 38)
 - 2. He also clearly recognized the folly of fighting God. (Num 23:8)
 - 3. He taught that God is not like man or subject to him! (Num 23:19-20)
 - 4. He knew to worship God and offer sacrifices to Him. (Num 23:1-2)
- C. Balaam as a prophet could lose control of his heart.
 - 1. Balaam has similarities to Judas. Judas preached and worked miracles.
 - 2. Judas also had a hidden sin that started in his heart and grew into actions. (Jn 12:4-6)
 - 3. The Corinthians who has spiritual gifts were so warned. (1 Cor 14:32)
 - 4. Paul set an example and urged Timothy to do so. (1 Cor 9:27, 2 Tim 2:20-22)
 - 5. This is a progression that will lead you to a place that you never dreamed you would be.

II. Balaam lost his heart

- A. God will allow his people to be tested.
 - 1. The purpose of a test is to expose the heart and help one draw closer to God.
 - 2. The faithful Christian will fail some test with the goal that eyes may be opened to real repentance. Abraham and Peter had failures. (Lk 22:31-32)
- B. Balaam was called upon by a King who offered great riches. (Num 22:5-7)
 - 1. Balaam's reputation came from God. Balak did not know God.

- 2. Elijah made it clear that God's prophets were not for hire. (2 Kgs 5:15-16)
- 3. There was a great conflict in Balaam's heart. He had to make the choice to put the worldly desire to death. There would be a "winner" for his heart.
- 4. A clear stand will keep one away from temptation!
- C. Balaam would not be satisfied with the plain response from God. (Num 22:12-19)
 - 1. God's word is rarely hard to understand. Men can then make plain applications.
 - 2. Some are like children who will not take "no" for an answer. God is not like the pushover parent!
 - 3. The first outward step away from God is when Balaam wanted to know "what more the LORD will say to me."
 - 4. This is the driving force among worldly religions. "Necessity is the mother of invention."

III. Balaam lost his head

- A. By not being satisfied with what the Lord had revealed God's anger was kindled.
 - 1. In mercy God attempts to turn the heart of Balaam.
 - 2. He is caught up in a passionate obsession. Obsession has its own reality; has no concept of waiting; will pay any price and is very powerful.
 - 3. Obsession cannot see the future and its consequences. (Heb 12:16 17)
- B. Balaam shows the characteristics of "madness."
 - 1. His donkey speaks to him and he is unfazed! (Num 22:27-30)
 - God then "opened Balaam's eyes" to see the angel of the Lord with a drawn sword. Will the sight of the certain judgment of God change him? (Num 22:31-34)
 - 3. While Balaam speaks only what God says, the temptation grows greater. There was a reason God told him not to go!
 - 4. The idols of the heart must be destroyed. Playing middle ground is being like a yo-yo. Your idols may win. (Ezk 14:1-4)

IV. God's people were cursed by Balaam

- A. Those who are among God's people can do great damage.
 - 1. We read about how Israel cursed itself. (Num 25:1-3)
 - 2. How did this happen? Balaam found a way to get his money. (Num 31:16; Deut 23:4-5)
 - 3. Balaam knew how to attack God's people and sold himself to God's enemies for money. (Ex. Examples of bitter preachers making havoc of the flock of God)
- B. The doctrine a Balaam must be defeated in the church! (Rev 2:14-17)
 - 1. Instead of money there can be other worldly allures. (Ex. "Growth" and numbers)
 - 2. Those who are dissatisfied with Bible authority and stir the passions of the unstable. (Rom 16:17-18)
 - 3. Do not neglect to accept a "thus says the Lord!" Do not ridicule those who are "watchful!" (Acts 20:30-31)

Conclusion: Let us destroy all idols! (1 Jn 5:21; Col 3:5)
