Introduction: What is the real direction of our lives?

- A. Our God knows how to *open and expose hearts*! (Lk 2:34-35)
 - 1. Through *pain and opposition* "the thoughts of many hearts" were revealed.
 - 2. Even the righteous will at times have a sword "pierce through your own soul."
- B. Jesus knew what was in the hearts of men. He wanted them to see it too.
 - 1. He would not commit to those who just *looked like* supporters. (Jn 2:24-25)
 - 2. Most men *will hate and oppose* those who show them their hearts.

(Jn 3:19-20; 15:18-23)

3. What truths *about ourselves and our real priorities* are we learning?

I. What is a priority?

A. Jesus taught how *the heart reveals priorities*. (Lk 16:13)

Priority – 1. The fact or condition of being regarded or treated as more important. 2. The right to take precedence or to proceed before others.

- 1. We can conceal our hearts to others and to ourselves! Times of pain and isolation <u>can</u> <u>reveal our hearts to all</u>.
- 2. Jesus was a master in exposing the hearts of others. (Lk 10:25, 28-29, 36-37)
- 3. When Jesus addressed the churches of Asia, He let them <u>see their hearts</u>. (Rev 2:4, 2:9-10; 3:1, 15-16)
- B. How can we know what our real priorities are? Is Jesus in us? (2 Cor 13:5; James 2:18)
 - 1. Our *actions speak* to what we really important to us!
 - 2. What do we like to think about? ... to talk about?
 - 3. How do we <u>spend our time</u>?
 - 4. What do *our relationships* say about us?

C. What has been *taken away* from us during this pandemic? What have we missed?

- 1. There are some things *that cannot be taken away*. (Rom 8:35-37)
- 2. These times have actually *opened opportunities* to those who love God's word!
- 3. When God opens our hearts to see shortcomings, *blessings will follow*!

II. A clear commitment to God's priorities brings purpose with zeal

- A. When we do not have God's priorities, we are miserable. (Mal 1:13)
 - 1. There are things that *others are zealous* about that I strongly dislike. (Ex. Running)
 - 2. The heart of the hypocrite *pretends to love God* when they really love self! (Mt 6:2, 5)
 - 3. Hypocrites often have a religious zeal but it is poisonous and <u>treats people as</u> <u>discardable</u>. (Lk 13:14-16; Mt 23:14-15)
- B. Great *power and peace* is found in true zeal! (Titus 2:11-14)
 - 1. At times when I am troubled, I can go outside and see God's creation! My *mind is renewed and redirected*! Joy and strength come in knowing what really matters!
 - 2. God's *grace and care are at the center of this zeal*. It takes us out of self and into looking after and serving others.

- 3. True zeal *loves teaching and evangelism*! (Lk 15:7)
- C. How does this purpose with zeal *respond to threats and suffering*? (Lk 6:22-23)
 - 1. When our thoughts are where they should be, we will not be sidelined by bitterness!
 - Jesus went to the cross and stayed on the cross because <u>he stayed within God's</u> <u>purpose</u>! (Lk 9:51-53, Jn 11:16; Lk 23:34)
 - 3. How long are we sidelined *by things that do not matter*? We need to have new priorities emerge!

III. Starting over and ordering our lives with God's priorities

- A. If we have drifted then we must rebuild God's thoughts in our lives. It is in this sense that priorities must "emerge." (Heb 2:1)
 - 1. *How do we* "give more earnest heed to the things we have heard"?
 - 2. What do we do <u>when we get serious</u>? (Ex. Diet "flatting the curve!")
- B. Consider the example of Zacchaeus. (Luke 19:1-4)
 - 1. Zacchaeus was shocked *that Jesus was even interested in him*. A true understanding of God's grace can open the heart and crush our pride! (Luke 19:5-6)
 - 2. What did the Pharisees say about sinners? What *did Jesus say*? (Luke 19:7)
 - 3. God's way to start over *always involves repentance*. (Luke 19:8)
 - 4. When God offers you a chance to start over, you can do it! *What is holding us back*?
 - 5. What will happen when *Jesus thoughts become our own*? (Luke 19:9-10)
- C. Since I cannot do everything <u>What gets left out</u>?
 - 1. Ephesus had a great start but *they lost something essential*. (Rev 2:4)
 - 2. <u>Begin with thanksgiving and service</u>! When these things become a priority (that which we love!) then our choices will change.
 - 3. In many ways this kind of "starting over" can <u>be more difficult than</u> <u>becoming a Christian</u>. (Ex. How many fallen Christians in this area?)
 - 4. You must renew your conscience, overcome pride, and *have the courage to change* if you are to begin again.
- D. It takes a great faith *to leave the familiar*!
 - 1. Israel left Egypt, but most of them *had no faith*. (Heb 4:1-2)
 - 2. Look at *the trivial things they complained about*! (Num 11:4-6)
 - 3. Why do Christians *let things like this defeat them*?
- E. Where are we right now? *What is holding us back* from fully serving the Lord?
 - 1. As with the rich young ruler, Jesus sees our hearts and knows the things we must let go of. *Will we*? (Mk 10:21-22)
 - 2. We can do without many things *that have become habits*. (Lk 8:14)
 - 3. Ultimately, <u>we must be converted again</u>. This happened to Peter: "when once you have turned again" (NASV) (Lk 22:31-32)
 - 4. This change is so great that Jesus describes Himself <u>as being on the</u> <u>outside looking in</u>. He wants that zealous purpose to return! (Rev 3:19-21)
 - 5. What a joy to have Jesus return *for fellowship in our hearts and in our lives*!
